**NOVEMBER — A SMALL SACRIFICE TODAY**

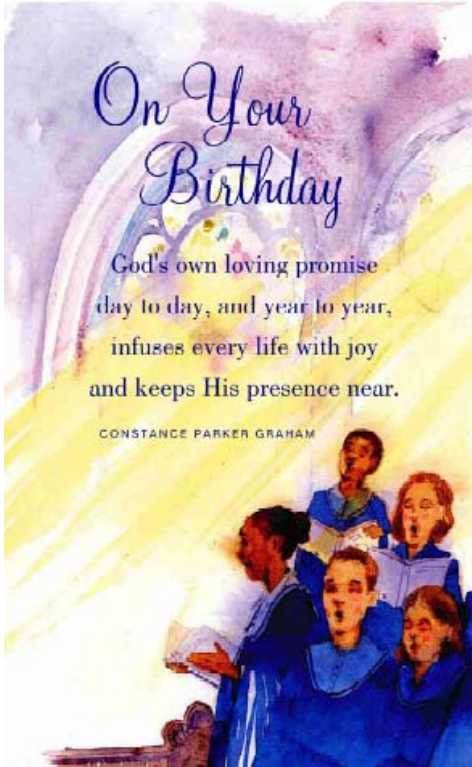

Ask the Chaplain - I have a friend who left the Church years ago, and I don't think he'll ever be back. What drove him out were all the changes. I too have found it hard to accept. How can the Church change? Isn't truth unchangeable?

Dear Knight,

Change in the Church is not new. The Church has been changing since the Resurrection. Many Catholics regret losing the Latin Mass yet don't realize that Latin wasn't always the language of the Mass. In the early Church, priests celebrated Mass in the language of the local people. The common language of the time was Greek. When knowledge of Greek declined, the liturgy was translated into many languages in the East and into Latin in the West.

The Church has always taught that truth develops and grows over time. We see this in the scientific knowledge we have today that our ancestors didn't have. We've had two thousand years to study and meditate about Christ. The early Church had only a few years. When I was young, I saw Jesus as God in a human shell ... mostly God and very little man. I didn't think he suffered much on the cross because his divinity protected him. Today I know I was wrong.

In 1943 Pope Pius XII opened the Church doors to Scripture scholars. As the scholars studied the languages and customs of Christ's time and the nature of the land, a clearer picture emerged. We were better able to understand Saint Paul's words: "For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but we have one who in every respect has been tested as we are, yet without sin" (Hebrews 4:15).

Jesus was present in his representatives at the Second Vatican Council that brought so many changes in the Church. Change is hard, hut sometimes it's the only way to grow. This is what Christ meant when he said: "Unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains just a single grain; but if it dies, it bears much fruit" (John 12:24).

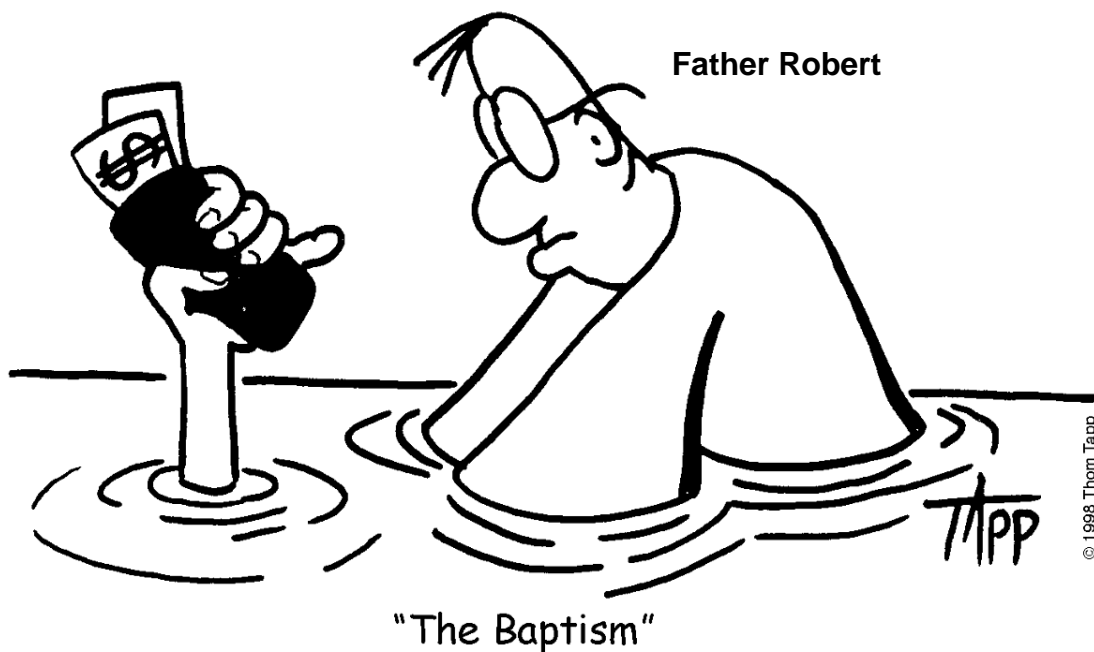

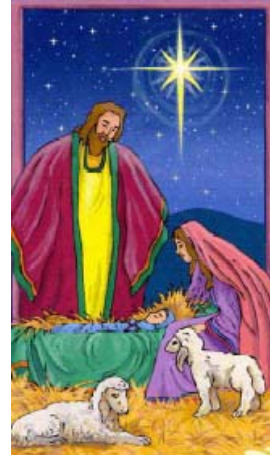
